Art is the **study** of materials and techniques when combined with ideas and

concepts. Our general Art and Design course aims to provide students with a **vast**

array of skills to allow them to develop into any **artistic** specialism. We make artwork out

of so many different **processes**, from drawing and painting to performance and sculpture, collage and photography to graphic design and textiles.

Most students **choose** to study this course if they are considering studying a higher-level Art

and Design course in the future, however some students choose it simply due to their **love** of creativity. Although making artwork is time consuming, it is also a very therapeutic and rewarding

process, to make something **visual** that can be enjoyed and admired by others. For many

students their artwork is a form of release and the biggest ingredient for **success** in this course is a love for the subject.

Students are **expected** to spend at least 4.5 hours per week on their artwork, but many students spend longer than this, as making artwork can be **time consuming**.

The first year of the course teaches students lots of new and exciting techniques and processes. It allows for **experimentation** and trial and error.

Year 2 is made up of coursework and exam components, with Component 1 being worth 60% of the overall grade and Component 2, the exam, being **worth** 40% of the A level.

Work is **assessed** internally and then externally when the **AQA** moderators visit us.

An **excellent student** in Art and Design is someone who;

- listens to, and learns from, feedback
- Understands the assessment objectives
- Is naturally creative
- Creates lots of artwork in their own time
- Is inspired by everything around them
- Takes lots of photography
- Is always on the lookout for new ideas
- Uses the art studio in their free periods
- Makes friends with fellow Art students
- Is open to trying out new things
- Challenges themselves with their artwork
- Uses the work of other artists to inspire their own workload
- Writes down their ideas and fulfils them
- Never finishes (as there is always another idea that can be trialled!)
- Completes all of the tasks on their 'to do' lists
- Is organised

- After A level, some students decide to apply to a 1-year Art and Design Foundation course, which can allow for easier access onto an Art based degree course. However, as we cover lots of the techniques that a Foundation course would cover, it is not essential to do this after our general Art and Design A level.
