WHAT A GREAT START TO THE YEAR

People sometimes say to me that things move fast at D6A and this last period has been no exception. Over the summer four new classrooms were added to the College campus to increase capacity for additional students - when our A level results came in and out of 910 A level entries, 87% of students received A* - C grades, we knew this extra capacity would be needed. Our first externally assessed A level results have cemented D6A's identity as the A level provider of choice for Bradford. A busy enrolment period led to the College expanding with over 1100 students now on roll primarily studying A level courses. Another milestone to celebrate was reaching 25 students who are now studying medicine at University since the College opened in 2019.

For me, For me, one of the highlights of the College year so far has got to include the take-off of student

The mantra for all student activities this academic year is that we want everything to be 'bigger and better' than ever before, and our Autumn charity and culture day did not disappoint! Staying with the theme of bigger and better, our YR2 students are in the process of submitting UCAS applications – with 62 early submissions already sent for Oxbridge, medicine and dentistry applications.

We have had a fantastic start to our first term of enrichment activities at D6A with YR1 students engaging in weekly sessions in their chosen enrichment. This is part of an ongoing project between D6A and the Yorkshire Dales National Park Authority to involve our students in valuable community activity and build familiarity with unfamiliar locations.

WORK PLACEMENT #INVESTINYOURFUTURE

At D6A we encourage students to participate in work placements and university research opportunities to help them to make decisions about their future progression and develop skills to support their future success and applications. Two students tell us more about their placements:

KELVIN EDEWI



Where was your placement?

My placement was at the University of Bradford.

Describe your responsibilities on placement?

I completed research on the topic of Radio Frequency Identification (RFID) Tags; discovering existing applications of RFID tags in healthcare and suggest potential applications for the future. RFID Tags utilise (mainly) radio frequency to transmit data.

What skills did you develop whilst on placement?

I was able to develop the skill of undertaking research independently and preparing an appropriate report, presenting my findings, including titles, subtitles, references and a bibliography.

What advice would you give to any D6A students thinking of doing a placement?

It's going to require commitment, but at the end of the day there are no disadvantages and quite a lot of advantages.

I was particularly impressed by the mature way you approached your placement and the initiative, determination and resilience you demonstrated. Where was your placement?

My placement was in the physics facility building at the University of Leeds.

Describe your responsibilities on placement?

At my placement, I was given a very large data set of about 200,000 data values from a previous PhD student, from which I was set to derive different correlations revolving around minorities.

What skills did you develop on placement?

I learnt a lot of new skills, such as using SPSS software and a lot of statistical techniques; however, I also greatly improved my teamwork.

What did you enjoy most about your time on placement?

I enjoyed virtually every part of my placement, but I especially enjoyed working under professors each day at the University. The university student I was working alongside was so helpful, not just relating to the placement but also giving great advice for what to do after college.

What advice would you give to any D6A students thinking of doing a placement?

I'd definitely encourage you do go for it, not only does the placement give you practical experience (you can also later apply for many awards such as the Gold Crest from your research paper) but it gives you great insight into university life as well.

Your engagement with all aspects of the placement is clear and I know that everyone at the University of Leeds thoroughly enjoyed working with you and was very impressed with your professional, polite and mature attitude to the project. My role it to support underrepresented minority groups within College and ensure they are treated with respect and that their diversity is celebrated.



OUR BIG MOVE WITH STUDENTSHIP

The most important thing for Dixons Sixth Form right now is studentship.

By studentship we mean how D6A students study, how they learn and how they remember better. Naturally, it involves a close look at how staff help them to do these three things too. It permeates every area of college - how we act in classrooms, how we use the library, how we can access resources outside of College and how students engage with enrichment opportunities and trips.

D6A TRIPS AND VISITS TRIP WEEK 10TH OCTOBER 2022


THE UNIVERSITY OF YORK AND YORK CENTRE

On Wednesday 12th and Friday 14th October all YR1 students visited York for the day. Students spent half the day at The University of York, a highly respected Russell Group institution within reasonable commutable distance of Bradford. Attending talks and workshops from the University of York staff and Student Ambassadors on choosing university courses and undergraduate life, D6A students were also taken on campus tours.

The other half of the day was spent in the city centre where students were guided around sites such as the Shambles, York Minster, Clifford's Tower and Museum Gardens. D6A students were also seen cruising down the River Ouse seeing the city from a different perspective. Both parts of the day helped students begin to consider what they want from a university, both in terms of the campus and city centre, which will certainly be beneficial when UCAS decisions need to be made in the summer term of YR1.

Over the two days students had a great time making new friends and getting to know D6A staff whilst pushing themselves out of their comfort zone.








THE CAMBRIDGE GREEK PLAY

Bright and early on Wednesday 20th October, fifteen keen (if still half a sleep) Classicists set off on a day trip to Cambridge to watch a combined performance of the world's oldest surviving play (Aeschylus' 'Persians') and the world's only surviving satyr play (Euripides' 'Cyclops'). Upon arrival, they took the opportunity to explore university options by having a guided tour of Queens' College, where Cambridge students live, work and socialise. The autumnal grounds and 17th century architecture were of course gorgeous, the scale and silence of the library made everyone want to grab a book, and students had fun deciphering some Latin inscriptions in the chapel. Next stop was the Classics Faculty and a guided tour of the Cast Gallery, a museum of replicas of all the best Greek statuary arranged chronologically. The thoughtful and enthusiastic questions posed to our tour guide were a delight to see. A preshow lecture by Professor Cartledge was followed by the main event itself. Performed entirely in the original language, students found themselves transported back in time 2500 years to 472BC to see an imagining of the Persian court receiving news of the destruction of its forces at the battle of Salamis. The icing on the cake for Robert Mclean (Teacher of Classics) was that the leading actor was one of his exstudents. D6A were supported by charity 'Classics for All', which provided a grant of £250 to substantially reduce the cost for our students.





APPRENTICESHIP FAIR

Chosen D6A YR2 students had a great day out in Harrogate at the Yorkshire Show Ground where they were able to engage with apprenticeship firms and find out more about what opportunities are available to them after College.

The apprenticeship companies seemed very impressed with our students and their enthusiasm towards finding out about options, communicating with professionals and asking pertinent questions.

BLACK HISTORY MONTH

Black History Month in college is a time for us to celebrate black culture and the impact individuals from the black community have in the world today. Our D6A African Caribbean society made resources that featured black icons from around the world, each poster introduced a figure and explained the impact they have had in their field, be it STEM, literature, sport or music.

During Black History Month, on the 18th of October, a group of our students took a trip to The University of Sheffield to engage in a day interacting with students and academics through a range of activities developed to stimulate discussion and explore themes related to race and slavery in modern Britain. This was a great opportunity for our students to see the research being carried out by academics within this field.



Francisca Nneka Divide is a Professor of Physics, and her array of research interest include solid earth geophysics, atmospheric physics, and climate variability. She made history for being the first indigenous woman professor in physics in Eastern Nigeria and has been providing opportunities for girls and young women to become interested in STEM. She is dedicated to understanding climate change and has won multiple awards for her contributions and dedication to research that is paving the way for solutions for climate change.



Youssou Madjiguerie Ndoor is a renowned singer in the Francophone countries. One of the creators of mbalax that involutionised Senegalese music. The Senegalese singer known internationally for "7 seconds" in 1994 which he won a Grammy for, and singing at the 1998 FIFA World Cup. The 2017 Nobel prize winner still continues to communicate his message and his identity through his songs. He is part of Senegal's pride and resides in the Senegalese prople's heart, his success will remain unfocerttable even after his death.
