Reflects thoughtfully on their own values, behaviours, and attitudes in relation to care.

Shows genuine empathy and understanding of the needs of different individuals.

Uses inclusive and person-centred language in discussion and coursework.

4. Communication and Teamwork

Participates meaningfully in class discussions and group work.

Can adapt communication to suit different audiences (e.g. children, elderly, professionals).

Demonstrates leadership when appropriate and supports others respectfully.

5. Professionalism and Integrity

Demonstrates mature, respectful behaviour in class and during placements.

Assessment:

The unit will be assessed through one examination of 80 marks lasting 1 hour and 30 minutes. Students will be assessed through multiple-choice, short- and long-answer questions. The questions will assess knowledge and understanding of human growth and development through the life stages; application of knowledge of the factors affecting human growth and development across each life stage and making connections between lifestyle factors and health inequalities; and evaluation and analysis of health and social care workers and how they promote, prevent and treat health conditions at different life stages.

Unit 1: Human Lifespan Development – Health & Social Care (AAQ)

Over the summer, you are expected to complete the following research task to help you prepare for your course in Health and Social Care.

✓ Task: Life Story – Tracking Human Development

Choose **one person** to research and explore their **lifespan journey**. This could be:

- A well-known public figure (e.g. athlete, actor, political leader, writer)
- A family member or someone you know (with their permission)
- Yourself

Your Task Is To:

Create a **detailed case study** that tracks their development through the **six life stages**:

- 1. Infancy (0-2 years)
- 2. Early Childhood (3-8 years)
- 3. Adolescence (9-18 years)
- 4. Early Adulthood (19–45 years)
- 5. Middle Adulthood (46–65 years)
- 6. Later Adulthood (65+ years)

For **each stage**, research or describe the following types of development:

- Physical development (e.g. growth, mobility, puberty, health changes)
- Intellectual development (e.g. learning, memory, thinking skills)



- Emotional development (e.g. attachment, relationships, self-concept)
- **Social development** (e.g. friendships, family, work life)

How to Present Your Work:

You can choose one of the following formats:

- A written **report or booklet** (minimum one paragraph per stage)
- A timeline with detailed notes for each life stage
- A PowerPoint/Google Slide presentation
- A scrapbook-style project with images and notes

Be creative – but make sure your content is accurate and informative!

Things to Think About:

- How did life events (e.g. illness, education, relationships, career, bereavement) affect their development?
- Can you make links between different types of development? (e.g. how emotional changes affect social development)
- If you're using a celebrity, research interviews or biographies to find real insights.

Task: Body Systems Research Project

Your job is to research five key human body systems and explain their structure, function, and importance in health and social care.

A Systems to Research:

- 1. Respiratory system
- 2. Circulatory system
- 3. Digestive system
- 4. Nervous system
- 5. Musculoskeletal system

For Each System, Include the Following:

Section What to Include

Name of the system e.g. Respiratory system

Main organs/components e.g. lungs, trachea, diaphragm

Function What does this system do in the body? **Diagram** Labelled drawing or printed image

One common disorder/condition e.g. asthma, stroke, arthritis How the disorder affects daily life Realistic example of impact

Support available How health & social care professionals help (e.g. medication, therapy, lifestyle advice)

You can present your research as:



- A poster or booklet
- A PowerPoint or Google Slides presentation
- A handwritten **project or folder** with drawings and information

Try to be creative – include colour, labels, and clear explanations in your own words.
