Welcome to Religious Studies

Subject outline

The content of the Religious Studies A Level course, focuses specifically on Philosophical and Ethical thinking as well as the study of the religion, Islam.

To do well in this A level you will need to have an interest in the world we live in today and how it has changed and continues to change in terms of beliefs, ideas and practices.

Students will however continue to develop an understanding and appreciation of religious thought and its contribution to individuals, communities and societies, as well as maintain and further opportunities to express their ideas both verbally and in writing in lessons and for independent study.

The Russell Group of Universities describe Religious Studies as a subject which provides 'suitable preparation for entry to university education generally' and is therefore seen as a rigorous and challenging A Level to study.

Religious Studies at A Level consists of three units:

Philosophy of Religion:

- Ancient philosophical influences: Plato and Aristotle
- the nature of the soul, mind and body
- Arguments about the existence or non-existence of God
- The nature and impact of religious experience
- The challenge for religious belief of the problem of evil
- Ideas about the nature of God
- Issues in religious language.

Religion & Ethics:

- Normative ethical theories: Natural Law, Situation Ethics, Kantian Ethics, Utilitarianism
- The application of ethical theory to euthanasia and business ethics
- Ethical language and thought
- Debates surrounding the significant idea of conscience
- Sexual ethics and the influence on ethical thought of developments in religious beliefs.

Study of Religion: Islam

- Religious beliefs, values and teachings, their interconnections and how they vary historically and in the contemporary world
- Sources of religious wisdom and authority
- Practices which shape and express religious identity, and how these vary within a tradition
- Significant social and historical developments in theology and religious thought
- Key themes related to the relationship between religion and society.

Assessment

All 3 units have examinations that are taken at the end of Year 2:

Paper 1 - Philosophy of Religion- 2 hours, 33.3%

Paper 2 - Religion and Ethics- 2 hours, 33.3%

Paper 3 – Study of Religion – Islam - 2 hours, 33.3%

A Level Religious Studies can assist entry to a diverse range of university courses, such as English Literature, History, Psychology and Law. 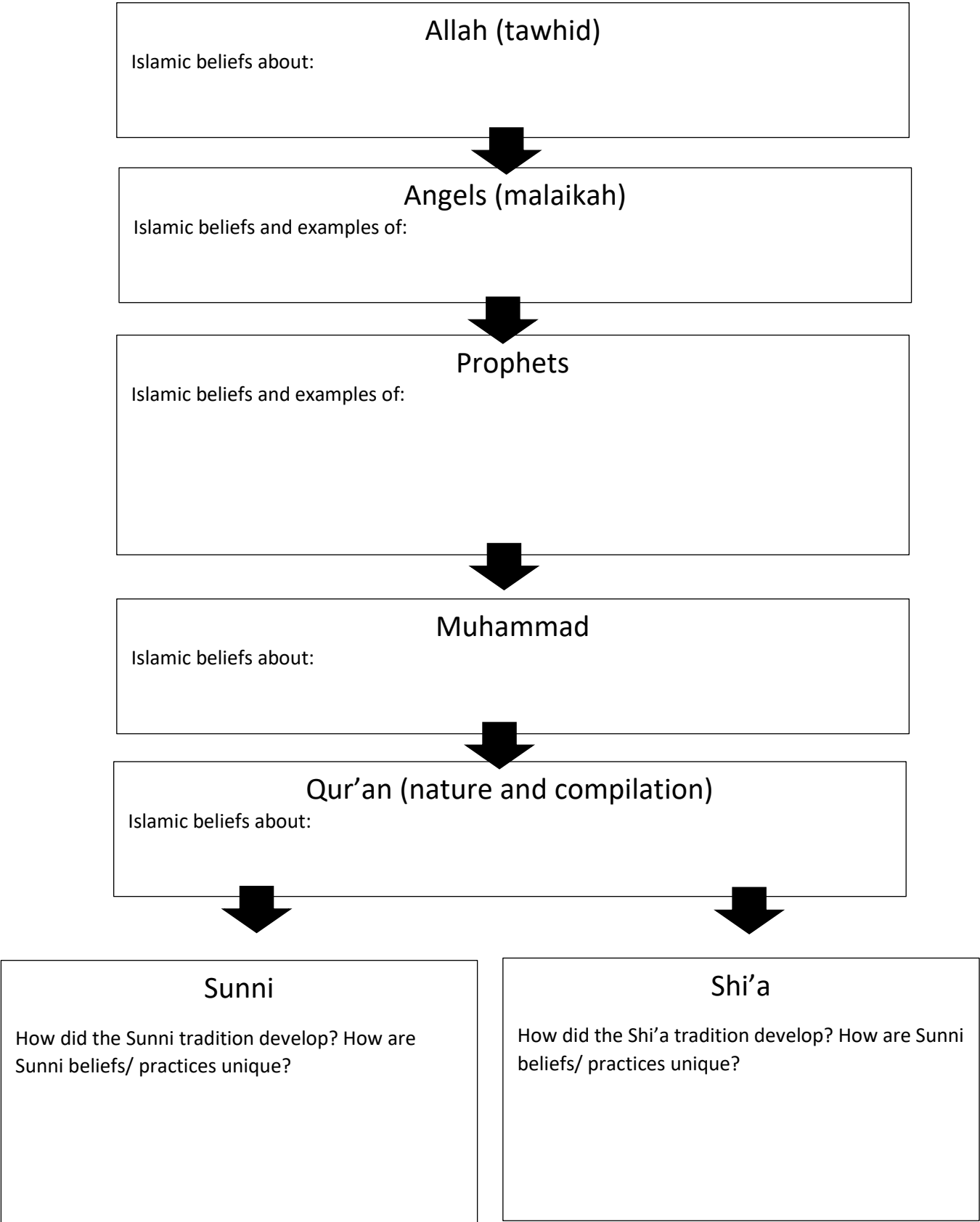

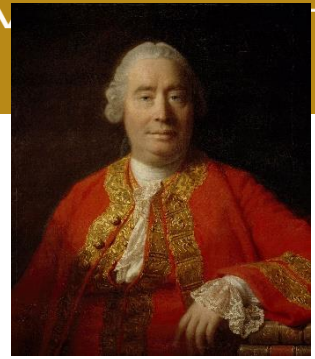
