

WHAT IS POLITICS?

How democratic is the UK? What is freedom? What will be the long-term consequences of the Coronavirus pandemic? The war in Ukraine? If you take an interest in these sorts of questions, this course will certainly be of interest to you. Politics involves the study of power, who gets to make the important decisions and why. It is an ever-changing field of study which explores the 'here and now' of decision making in the UK and beyond.

WHY STUDENTS CHOOSE THIS COURSE

There has never been a better time, or a more pressing need, for students to understand how our political system works. Topical questions tackled by our students include:

- Why do we have an unelected House of Lords making laws on our behalf?
- What sort of PM is Rishi Sunak?
- How has Keir Starmer changed the Labour party?
- Are our elections fair?

Most importantly this subject empowers students to be active and engaged citizens, it decodes the language used by politicians so that young people can hold their leaders to account.

WHAT STUDENTS CAN DO WITH THIS COURSE

Politics is an excellent course for developing your ability to analyse the way the world works, improving communication skills and developing your ability to create detailed and substantiated arguments. Politics goes particularly well with History and Economics but complements the other social sciences and humanities. It also adds breadth to a Science application. Politics is recommended for anybody hoping to progress into politics, public service, the armed services or law.


